PUTTING HARM REDUCTION INTO ACTION: COUNSELING SKILLS FOR PROFESSIONALS WORKING WITH ACTIVE DRUG USERS

Wednesday, October 1, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm
Richard Elovich, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: \$70

In this training, participants will (1) learn principles of a strengths-based framework for counseling that can be adapted to different service settings and programs; (2) examine their experience working with active and relapsing drug users and the practical value of establishing a collaborative relationship and attuning their counseling approach to individual clients' capacities, readiness and interest in change; (3) learn specific strategies and tools for self-directed and realistic behavior change; (4) understand their own professional growth and development in terms of "reflective practice"; and (5) explore a model of clinical supervision to reflect on the use of concepts and the effectiveness of strategies and tools.

WEARING TWO HATS: PRACTICING HARM REDUCTION FOR COUNSELORS AND CASE MANAGERS WHO ARE THEMSELVES IN RECOVERY

Friday, October 3, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm
Richard Elovich, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: \$70

This training addresses the concerns of people in recovery who work in harm reduction programs or with active and relapsing drug users where situations may be difficult and challenging. Participants will have an opportunity to understand their own professional growth and development in terms of "reflective practice." Training modules explore conflicts between personal experiences of addiction and recovery and helping clients who: continue to use, stop one drug but continue to use another, are ambivalent about or resistant to change or service goals, or are not interested in recovery or change. In a safe and non-judgmental setting, through open dialogue and interactive discussion, participants will be able to clarify and affirm their own value systems while learning to pause and reflect when strategies are not working. Participants will also use these situations to develop the capacity to expand their repertoire of approaches and skills for a wider range of possible counseling outcomes and treatment modalities.

START AN OPIOID OVERDOSE PREVENTION PROGRAM AT YOUR AGENCY: Opioid Overdose — Build Your Skills & Knowledge — Get the SKOOP!

Course Fee: **FREE**

CASAC credits are available for this course

***Note: Individuals should register for this course only if you are a director, supervisor or program coordinator interested in establishing an Opioid Overdose Prevention (SKOOP) program at your agency.**

Heroin (and other opioid) overdoses are a common cause of death among users, yet these deaths are often preventable through education, mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and when possible, through the administration of Naloxone (Narcan). In this workshop, participants will start by learning the essentials of preventing opioid overdose deaths, including prevention, recognition, and action. Participants will receive a certificate as a Trained Overdose Responder and become qualified to train heroin or opioid users and colleagues at their own facilities on how to prevent an overdose. Participants will learn how to implement a NYS DOH-approved program with support from the Harm Reduction Coalition.

REACHING SEX WORKERS

Thursday, October 2, 2008 • 10:00am-1:15pm

This workshop is for outreach workers, program managers, and direct service providers who want to make services more accessible *and* effective for sex workers. Discussion will focus on the population(s) participants serve. Suggestions will be offered on how to reach sex workers, how an agency or program can create an accessible environment, and what information would be helpful when serving the targeted population(s).

DRUG RESISTANCE & HIV

Tuesday, October 7, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Adam Viera, *CBA Specialist, African American Capacity Building Initiative (AACBI), Harm Reduction Coalition*,
Course Fee: \$70

The widespread availability of antiretroviral (ARV) therapy has made living with HIV easier. Working closely with their medical providers, people must carefully choose and monitor their HIV treatment. Becoming resistant to treatment is one of the most important issues facing a person on ARVs. Fortunately, there is a wealth of knowledge and resources available to assist clients/patients. This training will provide participants with an understanding of how drug resistance to HIV treatment medications develops, and how to work with clients/patients who are on ARVs. At the conclusion of this training, participants will be able to: define drug resistance, comprehend the importance of treatment adherence, and understand the impact of drug resistance on HIV treatment.

HERBAL THERAPY & HARM REDUCTION

Friday, October 10, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm
Adam Seller, *Director, Pacific School of Herbal Medicine*
Course Fee: \$70

This training will cover the safe use of herbal medicine for common issues facing active drug users, giving providers specific tools as well as an understanding of the strengths and weaknesses of herbal medicine as a primary and secondary supportive modality. We will cover herbal support for client self-care and care offered by providers for maintenance, detox, withdrawal, crisis management, safer injection drug use, hepatitis, HIV-related issues, herb-drug interactions, and contraindications. We will discuss goal-setting for both short and long-term support for positive change in clients dealing with current and past substance abuse, and touch on legal issues for licensed and unlicensed care providers, culturally appropriate herb use in different ethnic populations, and herbal preparation needs of homeless clients.

LGBT Education & Outreach Training Series

DOMESTIC & INTIMATE PARTNER VIOLENCE IN LGBTQ COMMUNITIES

Thursday, October 9, 2008 • 10:00am-1:15pm

Darlene Torres, *Education & Hotline Coordinator, The New York City Gay & Lesbian Anti-Violence Project*, Course Fee: **FREE**

In this training, participants will understand the differences and similarities between lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and HIV-affected (LGBT) domestic and intimate partner violence (DV/IPV) and heterosexual DV/IPV. Community members will be able to define DV/IPV, understand the cycle of violence, as well as have a working knowledge of how to safety plan. Service providers will be able to develop best practices when working with LGBTQ DV/IPV survivors.

LGBT-FRIENDLY THERAPY: WHAT THERAPISTS & CLIENTS NEED TO KNOW

Wednesday, October 29, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Lorraine Pirro, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: **FREE**

This training will address major factors that need to be present in creating and implementing an LGBT-friendly mental health counseling practice. Issues which will be addressed include, but are not limited to: stigma, HIV status disclosure, substance use and its meaning for individuals and couples, club drugs and the social scene, interacting with families of origin, the special needs of young adults, and LGBT relationships throughout the life-cycle. Finally, participants will weigh in on: "the therapist's orientation – same or different from the client – does it matter?" Small group exercises and case studies will illustrate key guiding principles, and a reading list and networking regarding LGBT-friendly therapists in the metro area will be explored. Clients will learn how to interview and screen for therapist characteristics they need, and providers will learn how to ensure open dialogue while practicing psychotherapy utilizing a harm reduction model.

DEMYSTIFYING THE TRANSGENDER EXPERIENCE: BUILDING COMPETENCY AMONG MENTAL HEALTH PROVIDERS

Wednesday, November 5, 2008 • 10:00am-1:15pm

Samuel Lurie, *Director, Transgender Training and Advocacy*, Course Fee: **FREE**

As the visibility and activism of transgender and gender-variant people has grown, providers need to increase their understanding of basic issues related to the transgender experience. Further, counseling centers and individual providers are increasingly seeing transgender patients, but are often unsure about best practices and basic clinical information. This workshop will provide basic information about transgender issues and present strategies, standards of care, and resources for incorporating appropriate, effective support in the therapeutic or advocate relationship.

INNOVATIVE SUPPORT GROUP DESIGN FACILITATION & MANAGEMENT WITH THE LGBTQ COMMUNITY

Tuesday, October 28, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Doneley Meris, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: **FREE**

This didactic training assists mental health and service providers in structuring and managing support groups for recovery, harm reduction, and a variety of client populations. It will provide a framework on how to develop support group curricula, structured group process, exercises and activities, and evaluation mechanisms. User-friendly, pro-active, client and theme-focused co-facilitation skills will enhance the accomplishment of group norms and goals. We will focus on holistic and psychoeducational techniques that will identify life-affirming social and emotional connections for both facilitators and support group participants.

TRANSGENDER PEOPLE, HIV & ACCESS TO CARE

Tuesday, November 4, 2008 • 10:00am-1:15pm

Samuel Lurie, *Director, Transgender Training and Advocacy*, Course Fee: **FREE**

Transgender (TG) people face a daunting range of societal issues that influence barriers in receiving adequate, helpful, and appropriate care. Well-meaning providers are often unsure or uncomfortable asking basic questions about care. At the same time, the impact of HIV on gender-variant people is painfully high. This three-hour training will provide basic information about transgender issues and then move beyond the basics to address specific strategies for inclusion of transgender people in prevention and treatment programs by honoring the needs, contributions, and strengths of transgender folks.

HARM REDUCTION AND THE LGBTQ COMMUNITY: INROADS TO DRUGS, SEX, SEXUAL ORIENTATION AND RECOVERY

Tuesday, November 25, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Doneley Meris, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: **FREE**

This training will provide an overview of how harm reduction strategies impact diverse LGBTQ communities, exploring theoretical frameworks on how sexual identity and sexual orientation influence alcohol, tobacco and other drug (ATOD) use and abuse. We'll examine how human sexuality, in its multiple forms, affects recovery and relapse prevention dynamics and outcomes. This training will highlight clinical strategies and interventions on how best to address sexual orientation, stigma and gender biases, clinicians' countertransference concerns, and the primary needs of LGBTQ-identified individuals in sustaining and maintaining self-care.

WORKING WITH TRANSGENDER CLIENTS WITHIN A HARM REDUCTION MODEL

Tuesday, December 9, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm Imani Henry, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: **FREE**

Many organizations claim to have the knowledge and skills they need to provide quality services to the transgender community, yet many transgender individuals do not access healthcare or social services due to insensitivity and discrimination by staff. This highly interactive training is for providers seeking to enhance their skills working with the transgender community by: strengthening client engagement, providing transgender-sensitive services, and conducting effective outreach to the transgender community. Participants will learn more about political, medical, and social issues facing transgender individuals, and how to apply effective harm reduction strategies to meet their clients' needs.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE & RE-ENTRY

Tuesday, October 14, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Eddie Ellis, *Executive Director, Center for NuLeadership on Urban Solutions, Medgar Evers College, City University of New York*, Course Fee: **\$70**

This innovative training examines and explains the theoretical and practical basis for understanding the criminal justice system, with particular emphasis on the re-entry process of people returning to urban communities after incarceration. Presented in a new, non-traditional, community-specific perspective, this training is divided into four sections: (1) Introduction to Non- Traditional Approaches to Program and Service Delivery Systems; (2) Overview of the Criminal Justice System; (3) Understanding Re-entry; and (4) Critical Issues Confronting Service Delivery, Program Design and Public Policy. This training provides a detailed critique of service delivery, program outcomes, and offers specific and concrete methods for improving existing programs and services for those who interact with formerly incarcerated, substance using, welfare-to-work, and other urban populations.

BECOME A TRAINED OPIOID OVERDOSE RESPONDER

A Brief Overview of Opioid Overdose Prevention & Response

Thursday, November 20, 2008 • 5:00pm-6:15pm

Sharon Stancliff, *M.D., Medical Director, Harm Reduction Coalition*, Course Fee: **FREE**

***Please Note: This course is for anyone who wishes to be trained in how to respond to an opioid overdose.**

Learn how to prevent heroin and other opioid- related deaths among your clients and in the community. This course will present an overview on opioid overdose – the scope of the problem, risk factors, prevention, how to recognize an overdose and the actions to take to save someone's life, including the administration of Naloxone (Narcan). Participants will receive a certificate as a Trained Overdose Responder.

WOMEN & HIV

Thursday, December 18, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Camille Abrahams, *Director, AACBI, Harm Reduction Coalition* & Dorcey Jones, *CBA Specialist, AACBI, Harm Reduction Coalition*
Course Fee: **FREE**

This training will provide an overview of the impact of HIV/AIDS on women in the United States and globally, with an emphasis on the disproportionate impact on women of color. The facilitators will engage participants in an interactive format that will include a review of the epidemic, treatment issues and prevention strategies, including social and economic barriers to both, and gaps in research and services. At the conclusion of the training participants will be able to apply what they've learned in their own work settings.

OUTREACH TO CRACK & METHAMPHETAMINE USERS

Thursday, October 16, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Mark Kinzly, *HRC Consultant*, Course Fee: **\$70**

This workshop will demonstrate and discuss techniques for working with crack and meth users—a community traditionally neglected by service agencies. We will focus on outreach tools, materials, and harm reduction strategies that have been successful with this population. Attendees will leave with practical ideas and skills they can apply to their own setting and to the people they work with.

HEPATITIS C FOR SERVICE PROVIDERS: WHAT WE KNOW & WHAT WE CAN DO

Friday, October 17, 2008 • 10:00am-5:00pm

Narelle Ellendon, *HCV Director, Harm Reduction Coalition*
Course Fee: **\$70**

As a majority of those who are Hepatitis C positive are current or former injecting drug users, this interactive training will focus on the needs of drug users with or who are at risk of being infected with Hepatitis C. Realistic strategies will be discussed for preventing Hepatitis C with injection drug users who continue to share drugs or who do not have clean equipment. An overview will be presented on the prevalence and natural history of and diagnostics and treatment for Hepatitis C, with a special emphasis on drug user-specific medical and policy issues. Service providers will have an opportunity to assess their own services and explore what possible Hepatitis C initiatives they can implement into their existing programs.

RECOGNIZING & PREVENTING BURNOUT
